

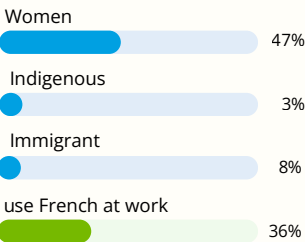

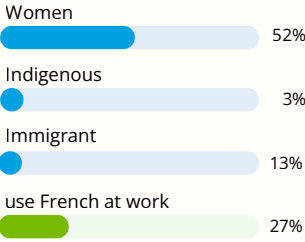

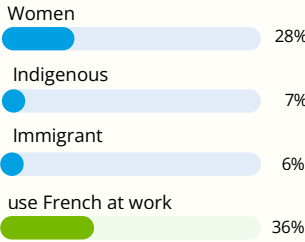

This workforce is a potential pool that can be mobilized to expand access to justice in French.

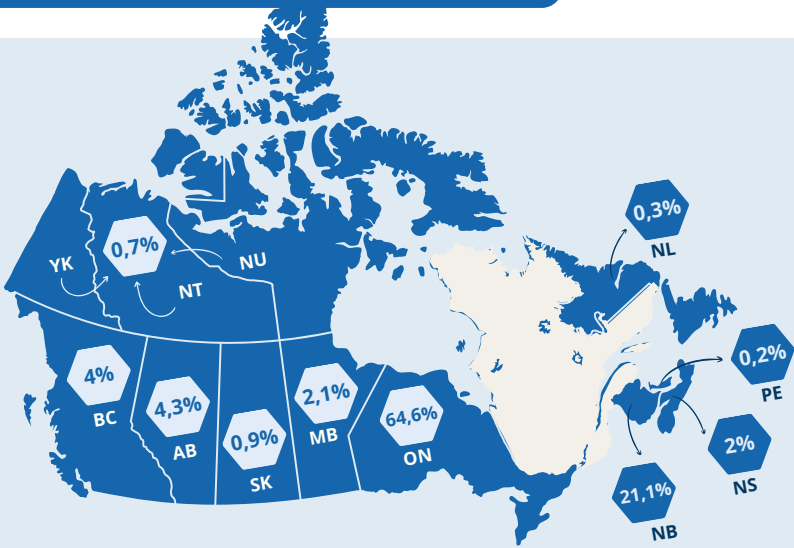
The linguistic potential of all Francophone justice professionals in Canada outside Quebec is 69.9%

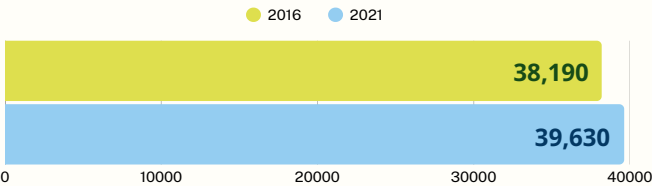

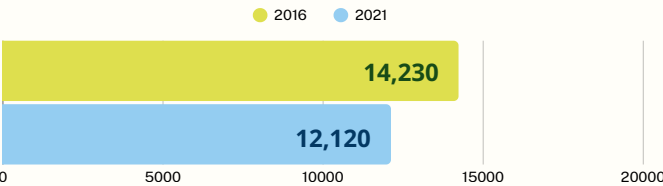
Provincial and territorial distribution of Francophone justice professionals in Canada outside Quebec who use French at work
